Neither Perfected not Defective

Some years ago, I mentored students in a Master of Fine Arts in Creative Writing program. These were highly gifted, extremely motivated people, and it wasn't hard to see where they could be in ten years if they stuck with it. On the other hand, they were virtually blind when it came to imagining their future selves. They already knew who they were, thank you very much. Some saw themselves as much better writers than they could possibly have been at that point in the journey. Others were convinced that, no matter how hard they tried, they were doomed to failure. My primary job as a mentor was to help them topple these false self-images, which were blocking their way forward.

But this toppling process was painful - a kind of death. Whether they suffered from bravado or from an inferiority complex, they'd become dependent on this self-made identity. The thought of letting go caused both grief and fear. Yet as Jesus points out in these mysterious lines from John, "unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains just a grain of wheat." What has to crumble before we can be born anew is the image we've created of ourselves. Great adventures lie ahead, but we can only taste and see what God has prepared for us if we're able to accept ourselves as we actually are: neither perfected nor defective, but instead, overflowing with potential.


Like grains, which - though tiny - contain universes.

St Patrick, Principal Patron of Ireland: Patrick was born between 385 and 389 on the west coast of Roman Britain before he was taken as a slave to Ireland, where he remained there for six years. At the end of that period he escaped back to Britain but could hear the call of the Irish people for him to return to them, and so he studied and became a priest, before being consecrated bishop in France and returning to Ireland about the year 432AD. He is said

to have died at Saul in north-eastern Ireland about the year 461. Today's celebration is a call to return to and to return to the Lord that faith to which Patrick devoted his life.



St Joseph, Husband of the Blessed Virgin Mary, Protector of the Child Jesus: Little is known about Joseph except that he was of the line of David which was essential in order for Jesus to be legally of the line and House of David in fulfilment of the Scriptures. What is more important for us is the example which Joseph left us. He was a man of faith who played his role in God's salvific plan for us; he was obedient to the will of God; he had a love for the Law and its fulfilment; he showed piety and

fortitude in times of trial; he had a chaste love for the Blessed Virgin Mary; and he exercised his paternal authority with due care. Joseph could very easily have walked away from Mary and her child but, being a man of faith, he heeded the message of the angel and took Mary as his wife despite the gossiping and judgement that must have come with it. He is, therefore, a true example of Christian living and is the Protector of the Church. Joseph is also the patron of carpenters and manual workers.
